***Due to COVID-19, this cohort missed their year 4 and 5 swimming provision.



Curri	culum P.E.:
-	All classes received two hour of timetabled P.E. per week throughout the year.
-	All classes timetabled additional 'Get Active' time throughout each week.
-	All children received one week of intensive swimming lessons provided by swimming teachers at Polkyth Leisure Centre.
Extra	-Curricular Provision:
-	Each term a range of sporting clubs were provided to all pupils.
-	These were provided by school staff, both teachers and teaching assistants.
-	Clubs were charged at a price of $\pounds 5$ for a term, with PP children able to attend for free.
Intra	-School Competition:
-	Throughout the year, in the region of twenty house-team competitions were held involving all children.
-	Some of these were conducted in class as part of the additional 'Get Active' sessions.
-	Some of these were whole school events, such as sports day.
Inter	-School Competition:
-	The school took part in many different sporting competitions, including friendly fixtures, local and county level
	competitions.
-	110 pupils represented the school in competitive sport (42.3%).
-	We had success with our Girls' football team reaching the county finals.
-	Our Year 3 cricket team also reached the county finals.
-	Our netball B Team won their local league.

D	Each year group received three weeks of Outdoor Education activities, Years 3 and 5 participated in fencing, Years 4 and 6 received archery lessons. This was to supplement our curriculum offer with activities we are not able to offer, allowing children to experience a greater range of activities.
105.00	Transport to Aspire Games	A D E	All children in year five attended the Aspire Games, an event that ensures every child in Year 5, regardless of ability, has the opportunity to enjoy a day of competitive sport at a 'proper' sports venue, receiving a team shirt and mixing with children from other schools.
720.00	Transport to Somerset Cricket T20 Match	A D E	The opportunity was given to all children in years 5 and 6 to attend a professional cricket match, Somerset v Hampshire in the T20 competition (in which Somerset went on to become national champions!). Both teams had international sports stars in. The children paid £10 to attend. The cost of a match ticket was £5, paying £5 towards transport. The transport was subsidised to keep costs down and ensure it was available to all. As well as watching the cricket, the Sky TV camera zoomed in to our school group several times, so the children were excited that they appeared on TV! We chose the first game of the season to inspire children to attend both our school cricket club, as well as promoting local cricket matches as well.
248.00	Transport to Fowey School	В	We arranged a bespoke sports event with out feeder secondary school, Fowey River Academy. This was to support the transition of our pupils, taking place in October just prior to children applying for secondary school. All of year six children attended, with ex-pupils being sports-leaders and leading the event, as well as speaking to them about life at secondary school. The premium was used to fund transport, so there was no cost to the children.

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1770.21	Transport to Sports Events throughout the year.	A D E	Transport to 15 different sports events, including the county football finals, three cricket tournaments, five cross country events and six football/netball fixtures. This allowed us to not only take our strongest players as part of the 'A Team', but where allowed, to take multiple teams. For example, in cross country a team is made up of 4 pupils. Many schools would take one team per category, whilst we regularly had 3 or more teams per category. Whilst we enter three football leagues, when other schools could accommodate, we would arrange additional friendly fixtures, meaning we were able to put out seven different mixed teams and four girls' teams through the year.
450.00	Specialist Sports Coach to run two sports day events.	A D E	All children participated in a day of competitive sport, with a focus on children achieving their 'Personal Best', as well as scoring points for their house team.
865.89	Purchase of 'Sports Colour' badges and medals to celebrate success.	A B E	Girls' football team all received a medal to recognise reaching the county finals. Year 3 cricket team all received a medal to recognise reaching the county finals. Netball team all received a medal to recognise winning their league. All children who represented the school received 'Sports Colours', a badge to wear on their tie to show they have represented the school.

3219.86	Sports Equipment for curriculum P.E., clubs and 'Get Active' sessions.	A D E	Equipment was purchased to ensure that P.E. lessons, clubs and Get Active sessions could take place, with a focus on ensuring adequate equipment for children to have enough for one-each, or in small groups as appropriate. For example, 60 footballs are available so every child at football club can practise independently, depending on the skill. There are enough basketballs, netballs, hockey sticks/balls, tennis rackets, etc. for a whole class to have adequate equipment. There were larger amounts spend to purchase a new set of gymnastic mats and netball posts, to replace old and worn out equipment.



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			We also bought a wider range of equipment, such as speed bounce mats, discuss and shot, to ensure children were able to experience a greater range of activities. We also bought different equipment, such as soft touch basketballs and pom pom balls, to ensure less experienced children were able to engage in lessons with appropriate equipment to build confidence at their ability.
